#### LIGH.

The Warneckii Dracaena thrives in bright, indirect light. While it can tolerate lower light conditions, keep in mind that in dimmer spots, its growth may slow, and the variegation on the leaves may fade. Direct sunlight, however, can cause the leaves to burn, so it's best to avoid placing it in direct sun.



#### SOII

For tropical plants we recommend our Rooted Goods All-Purpose Potting Mix, Uncle Mike's Organic Potting Mix, or Espoma's Organic Potting Mix. All three options are great choices for ensuring healthy growth and thriving plants.



### WATER

Dracaenas don't like sitting in soggy soil. It's best to let the top 1-2 inches of soil dry out before watering again. When you water, make sure to give it a thorough soak so that water drains out of the bottom of the pot. Be sure not to let the plant sit in a saucer of water for too long, as this can lead to root rot.



# **FERTILIZER**

We recommend fertilizers like Espoma Organic Indoor! Houseplant Food, Jack's Houseplant Special, or Organic Plant Magic. These options provide essential nutrients to keep your plants vibrant and thriving.



# **TEMPERATURE**

It thrives in temperatures between 65-80°F (18-27°C). Avoid placing your plant near cold drafts, air conditioners, or heaters, as these can cause stress and affect its growth.



# **ISSUES + FIXES**

Watch out for pests like spider mites, mealybugs, scales, and thrips. Regularly inspect your plant for signs of infestation and treat promptly with natural or chemical remedies.



## PRUNING & PROPAGATION

Take a 4-6 inch cutting from a healthy stem just below a node. Remove the lower leaves, leaving a few at the top. Root the cutting in water by placing it in a jar with the node submerged, changing the water every few days until roots form. Once the cutting has developed roots, transplant it into a regular pot.



## PET FRIENDLY?

The Warneckii Dracaena is not pet-friendly and is toxic to both cats and dogs if ingested.

Symptoms of poisoning can include vomiting, lack of appetite, or drooling. It's best to place the plant in an area that's out of their reach, or consider opting for a pet-safe plant instead.
